The Nollett House

The Nollett House, built in 1845 and located on Middlebelt Road near Cherry Hill, was slated for demolition this fall to make way for a strip mall.

The house had been owned by the Nollett family since it was built and was still in pristine condition. It had been offered to the City for \$1



in hopes that the administration would want it moved to the City Park or other property it owned, but the offer was refused. A phone call from Muriel Grima to Mrs. Ethel Nollett resulted in Mrs. Nollett gifting the Straight Farmhouse with her entire kitchen - cabinets and appliances. In addition, we were gifted with a beautiful carpet (now in our dining room) and doors from various rooms.

Once these gifts were brought to the SFH, Mike Bingham and Jerry Marquette began serious renovation of the kitchen in our rental area immediately. Mike has worked constantly since that time, upgrading electrical, removing old fixtures, painting, and installing all of Mrs. Nollett's gifts. All appliances are now in place:



stove, microwave, dishwasher, the double sink (deep!), garbage disposal, and the gorgeous cupboards!

All that remains to be done is removing the

carpeting in the kitchen and serving room and installing new flooring. It is so very beautiful! How do we adequately thank Mrs. Nollett?!

Mrs. Aldrich and her daughter have since sent family historical information and photos via our website which will soon be available to you in our Research Room. Her daughter expressed her happiness in her mother's childhood home now being the home of our Museum, and said she plans to bring **her** daughter for a visit sometime!
