Kyoko Kashiwagi will perform on violin, Eva Stern will perform on viola, and Paul Wingert will perform on cello.

The Quartet will be performing "museum pieces" according to Marian Tanau in our Museum--- a 350 year old J. S. Bach concerto, a 200+ year old Mozart piece, pieces by Borodin, Debussy, and folk music themes translated into classic pieces by Bartok plus other lively folk music.

A special guest performer, nine year old student of Marian Tanau, Olivia Popp, will perform a duet with him. Many of our ticket holders are especially looking forward to this segment!

Is History Really Boring?

In the 1500's, houses had thatched roofs -thick straw--piled high, with no wood
underneath. It was the only place for animals
to get warm, so all the cats and other small
animals (mice, bugs) lived in the roof. When it
rained it became slippery and sometimes the
animals would slip and fall off the roof. Hence
the saying, "It's raining cats and dogs."

There was nothing to stop things from falling into the house...this posed a real problem in the bedroom where bugs and other droppings could mess up your nice clean bed. Hence, a bed with big posts and a sheet hung over the top afforded some protection. That's how canopy beds came into existence.
