We Lost Another Friend

Frieda Affholter, one of the first members of the Friends of the Garden City Historical Museum, also a member of our Board of Directors, passed away November 14, 2008. Frieda had been a volunteer in our Museum when it was located in the Log Cabin in our City Park and served in this capacity for 10-12 years. She assumed the cataloguing duties for the Museum when she began helping John Niemi, Chairman of the Historical Commission, to keep the collection "alive" until more members joined the Commission. In the past, she was very energetic, but was unable to be at the Farmhouse as much as she would have liked this past year. She will be missed!

Headstone & Civil War Dog Tag Identified

Years ago, a headstone was given to the Historical Museum by a Garden City resident who had no idea whose it was. He had dug it up in his yard! Commission member Bill Brooks asked a friend of his. Rick Danes, if he could research and unearth any information about this headstone. Mr. Danes is Vice-Chairman of the Dearborn Historical Commission and a Past President of the Sons of Union Veterans, Mr. Danes came to the Farmhouse and did a chalk rubbing of the headstone, which revealed enough information for him to pursue on the Internet. The headstone was for two children who died in 1860 and 1863, daughters of Samuel N. Brady, born in Pennsylvania in 1833 and his wife, Louisa Van Akin Brady, born in Michigan in 1833.



The children's names are unreadable, but Mr. Danes researched U.S. census records from the 1850's - 1870's to discover the Brady's identities. "Early Days in Garden City" sold in our Lathers General Store features a photo of the "Van Akin House at 7130 Venoy and Warren Avenue, between being built c. 1833 and no later than 1850". The Civil War era metal dog tag inscription reads: William A. Showers, U.S.A. Mr. Danes found two possibilities for its original owner.

The first is a gentleman born in 1840 who resided in Parma in Jackson County, Michigan. He was later a Corporal in the Michigan 20th Infantry. He was killed in action at Spotsylvania Courthouse, Virginia in May 1864 and is buried in Fredericksburg National Cemetery in Virginia.

The other possibility, William Showers, was born in New York in 1843 and enlisted at Nankin in February 1862. He was a member of the 1st Michigan Sharpshooters, and was killed in action in November 1963 at Locust Grove, Virginia. He is also buried at Fredericksburg National Cemetery in Virginia.

Mr. Danes' complete reports are available in our Research Room at the Straight Farm House. We are very, very grateful for his research on our behalf!
